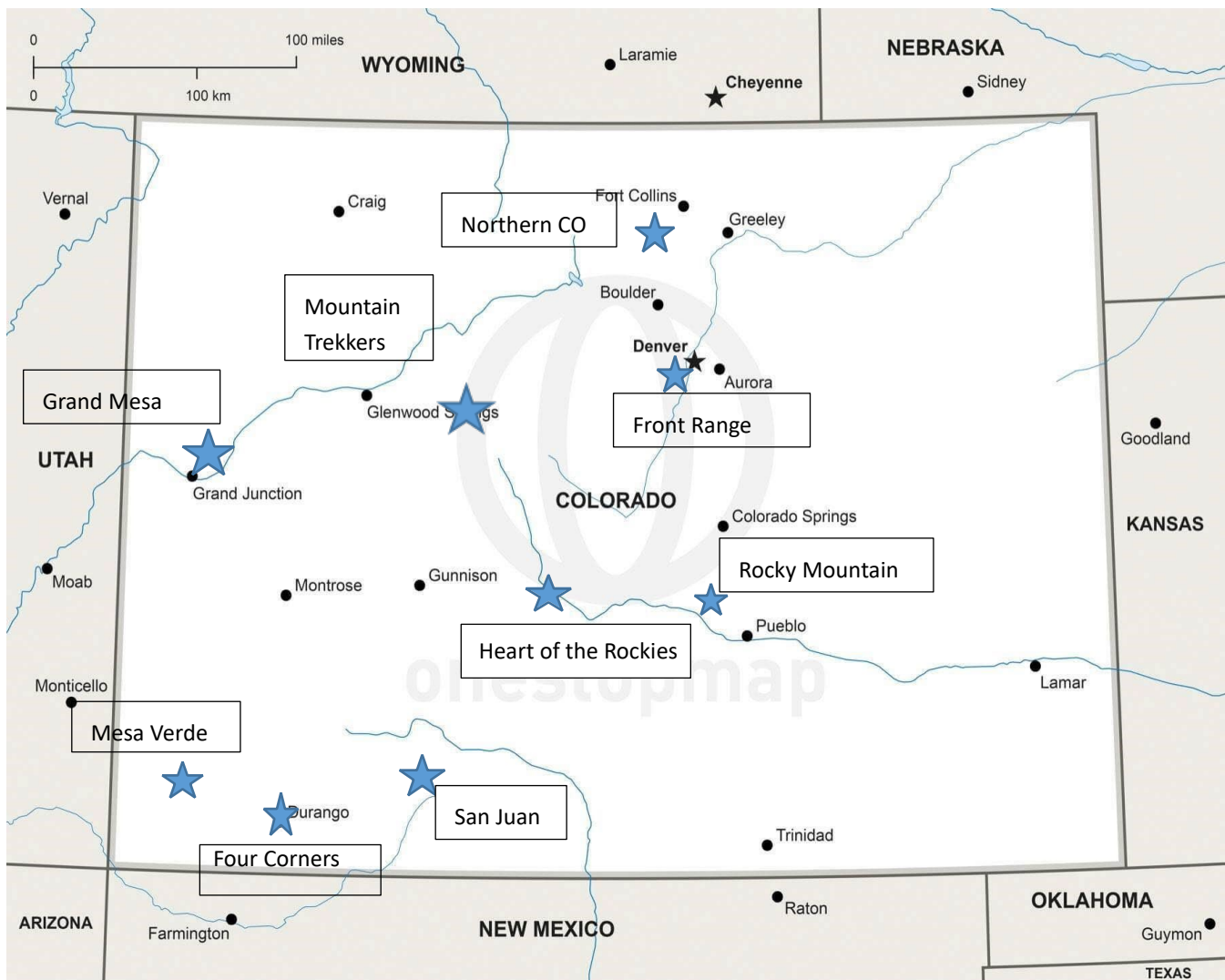

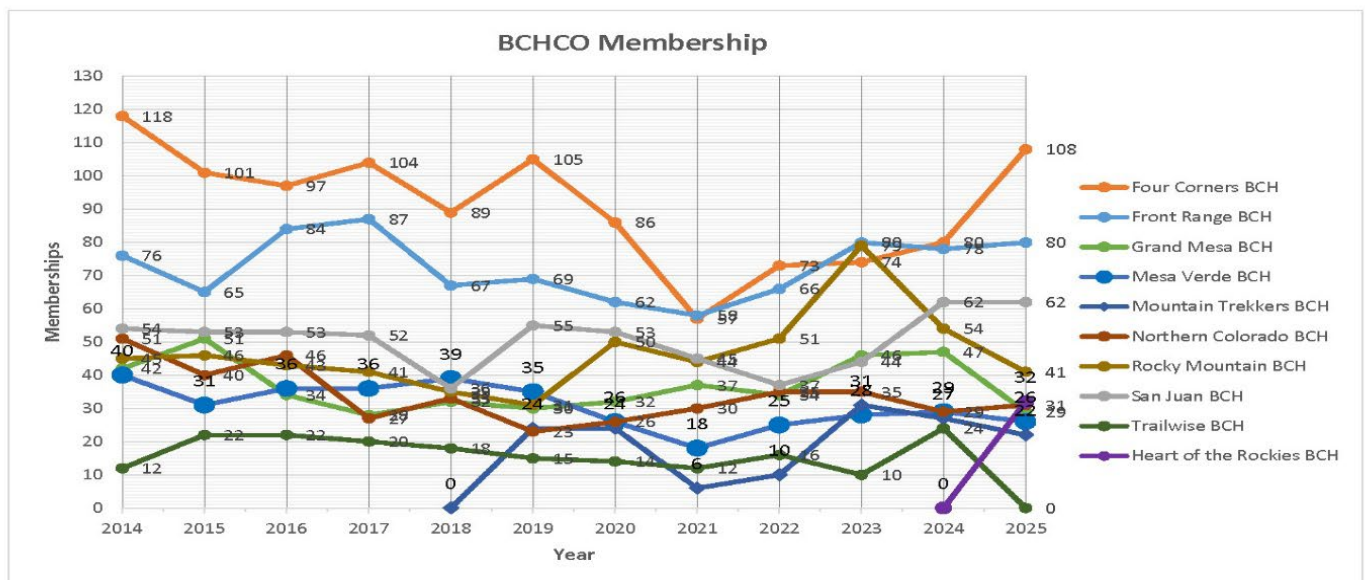

Accomplishments

Current and Future Projects

May – Weekend camping/clearing trip, heavily traveled multi-use area. Heavily overgrown and impassable huge, downed tree. Joint with a trail riding club to demonstrate our work and importance of keeping trails accessible and safe for all users to share. Educate and gain new members.

June – BCHCO state meeting; Wyoming state rendezvous

July – Mule day camping event to clear wire at Huerfano State Wildlife Area

September - Wire clearing project in Park County, most is barbed wire laying on top of and half buried in the ground. This is in a heavily hiked area.

October - Mike Brashear 3-day trail riding clinic at Fort Robinson, NE. Preparation, safety, and increasingly difficult trails to traverse.

December – Christmas Tree Cutting Ambassador rides, assist Forest Rangers during seven scheduled days for families to cut down their own tree.

Wish List - Horse Camping 101, Packing Clinic, Packing trips, involve youth.

Issues and Problems

- Long standing, experienced members are aging out (horses too). Difficult to get young people interested in doing “the work.”
- Not well known - increase our visibility and make our efforts known.
- Too few participants- recent staff cuts will make more volunteers needed.

Mesa Verde Back Country Horsemen (MVBCH)

Accomplishments

Trails & Facilities – The Mavreeso and Goble Trails require our annual use of chainsaws to clear. We had to do some reroutes and heavy brushing as both are high elevation trails and require quite a bit of maintenance. Snow always delays us a bit in the high country. MVBCH continues to maintain the Equestrian Facility at Transfer Campground.

Education/Outreach

On National Trails Day members provided public education about user interface on trails, handouts, and the opportunity to interact with horses and mules at a very popular spot, Sand Canyon.

A booth at 4 Corners Ag Expo provided information about our Chapter mission and a Crosscut Saw demonstration. Participants cut and branded wood rounds to be taken home with them.

Continuing education for our members included learning about Equine Dentistry and trail maintenance.

We are pursuing evolving partnerships with other outdoor stewardship organizations.

Many of our members have utilized their Wilderness Study Area Monitor training for the BLM.

Our newsletter is published monthly online. In addition to our website, a Facebook page is maintained with 332 members.

Current and Future Projects

- Pack out the old bridge from Bear Creek.
- Work with the BLM to maintain the trailhead parking area of the Summit Ridge Recreational Area.
- Provide pack stock support for USFS Projects on the SJNF and BLM Canyon of the Ancients National Monument.
- Provide educational outreach at a trailhead on National Trails Day.
- Award a \$1500 scholarship for higher education to a local graduate with an interest in outdoor resource management.
- Plan group campouts in support of trail workdays.
- Do monthly WSA Monitoring for the BLM.
- Put on a packing clinic to facilitate support of agency projects.
- Hold our annual Poker Ride fundraiser.
- Explore partnership with local trail user groups.
- Make sure our public lands remain in public hands.

Issues and Problems

- Our membership is aging. We need younger members over time.
- We want to monitor problems caused by non-equestrian use of equestrian campgrounds. This is quite a problem in the Transfer Horse Camp that we maintain.
- User Interface between bikers, e-bikers, and equestrians continue to be a challenge.

Northern Colorado Back Country Horsemen (NCBCH)

Accomplishments

Continued input - USFS regarding Jack's Gulch Campground Rebuild - Adopt a Trail reinstituted. Input regarding 3 additional Equestrian Campsites and improvements in campsites.

Continued involvement with Southeast Wyoming Outdoor Recreation Collaborative (SWORC).

Rebuilt Gate system into Pawnee Buttes for easier access for all user groups.

Access to new riding area ARPG - off the beaten path. Dispersed camping for the same.

Installed 8 Corrals on PNG. Established Equestrian Campground on PNG.

Education and Outreach

Ongoing attempt to reclaim a decommissioned campground (Pole Creek) on MBR. New Ranger/Recreation staff not receptive due to required reroute of existing trail and PMG.

New younger members were involved in NWSS Booth and have reached out to many local stables to promote NCBCH and BCHA.

Several events/rides/clinics planned for outreach/involvement.

Facebook page is being better utilized and updated regularly. Events published.

Current and Future Projects

- Spring 2025 - Set to begin the cleanup process of campsite picnic tables, bear boxes. Sandblast, paint and relocate some existing corrals to new sites.
- Replanting trees in and around JG Camping areas and surrounding burn scars.
- Rebuild 3 interior walkthrough gates on Granite Ridge Trail - RFL
- Rebuild 2 12' two track gates along Granite Ridge.
- Wire Removal - Lady Moon and Elkhorn Trails (small sections along each trail.)
- Assist as needed on the new ADA Trail being built from Lady Moon TH, RFL.
- Fence around newly updated Buckhorn Ranger Station facility. Asked for corrals.
- Maintain bridge over bog area - HQ TH Corrals
- Maintain corrals: Pelton Creek, WY...MBRTB Ranger District - Laramie, WY
- Maintain corrals: Headquarters TH...Pole Mountain Laramie WY
- Maintain corrals: State Forest State Park-Gould, CO
- Clearing/reestablishing connector trail between Elkhorn and Disappointment Falls (delayed again due to USFS burning - Red Feather Lakes)
- Continued efforts to get signage placed on Pole Mountain Trail System
- (delayed again due to focus on the PMG Project.)

CHAPTER REPORT: NCBC (Continued)

Issues and Problems

- Saw Certification particularly chainsaw certifications. FS priority: Firemen.
- Ongoing - The President and VP are expected to contact agencies. (Late in 2024 new, younger members have stepped up.)
- Retention of older members. Once their riding days are done, Chapter support stops.
- Some members only want social events: Rides - local and out of state, BUT nobody wants to plan or schedule them. (The President and VP are expected to do this.)
- Mountain Bikers are taking over many multi use trails, being more dangerous and disrespectful to other users. E-Bikes have compounded the problem.
- Reluctance of Members to utilize E-Bike Report or Campsite Report Forms.

CHAPTER REPORT

San Juan Back Country Horsemen (SJBCH)

Accomplishments

Trails & Facilities –

- In 2024 we actively sought donations and grants to meet our ambitious, long-range projects. These efforts yielded \$16,000 to add to our treasury with which we leveraged state and federal grants and paid directly for on-the-ground trail work by private crews.
- In partnership with the Pagosa Area Trails Council, we pledged \$18,000 in matching funds for a three-year CPW non-motorized trail grant for 2025 and totaling \$300,00 to clear trails and get much-needed trail tread work done using American Conservation Experience (ACE) and other crews. This is our most aggressive community-funded effort yet.
- We signed up an Amish trail crew from Alamosa as members of SJBCH and then paid their expenses and gifted them two Silky saws in lieu of wages. The hard working crew made two trips up to the Fish Lake Trail and cleared 173 trees off the trail.
- Following the Amish clearing of the Fish Lake Trail that is the gateway to the South San Juan Wilderness, for the third year in a row a crew of six SJBCH members packed 20 miles into the Wilderness area to finish clearing the Canon Rincon/Conejos River loop of trails – the first time these trails have been opened in decades. Over the three years we cut over 750 trees from those trails and the Fish Lake Trail and removed over 200 pounds of trash and abandoned equipment.
- With Trail Wise BCH folding in 2024, we reached out and asked those members to join SJBCH, because we are so close geographically and because we have worked closely with them on projects on the East side of the Divide. Since that time a number of TWBCH members have joined SJBCH, we are planning a Spring 2025 chapter meeting in South Fork or Del Norte to discuss 2025 trail and other work, and together we will also attend our annual Spring meeting with the three ranger districts of the Rio Grande National Forest to plan our work together.
- On National Trails Day (June 2024) we worked with several other local trail groups to clean up Treasure Falls east of Pagosa Springs on Hwy 160, the highest use developed site on the San Juan National Forest. Besides litter cleanup, painting, and brushing, we constructed several rolling dips on the Falls Trail that was badly eroding.
- Working with two other trail groups, we removed and rehabilitated 15 forest signs.
- We packed out a trail crew on Archuleta Trail, saving the San Juan Mountain Association \$2,500 in outfitter fees.
- We managed ticket sales for the Pagosa Springs Thursday Night Summer Rodeos in exchange for \$1200 in donations to the chapter for trail work.
- We actively sought more partnerships with local outfitters and guides so we can work together for the betterment of stock access in the back country, and in the face of increasing ATV, mountain bike, and eBike use in our area that threatens loss of stock access.

CHAPTER REPORT SJBCH (Cont.)

Education and Outreach

- We participated in the annual Pagosa Springs 4th of July Parade with ten riders.
- Our monthly *Pony Tracks* newsletter, which we share with members, agency personnel on two national forests and others, includes articles about BCHA mission, trail use, Light on the Land, stock use, etc., and is meant to inform and educate readers.
- We actively participate with the Pagosa Area Trail Council where we work proactively with other trail user groups to gain trust and find common solutions to sometimes difficult issues.
- We produced a new chapter brochure.

Current and Future Projects

- We hope to find a person to do fundraising for us so we can use our 501(c)3 status to go for more and larger grants to
- We are currently working with the *Pagosa Area Recreation Coalition* on a large-scale public planning effort with the Town of Pagosa, Archuleta County and U.S. Forest Service that is developing a long-term vision for recreation management in our area, including all the national forest lands of the Pagosa RD. Ideas and recommendations carried forward for this plan that will be completed in 2026 will be approved by the Archuleta County Commissioners, upon which a tax levy will be approved to get work done out on the ground. Following a similar project last year in Chaffee County, this plan is expected to get at trail work, trailhead parking for stock trailers, toilets, Wilderness work, and other work at town and county facilities. Because stock-using outfitters have been left out of the process, and in the general interest of stock use in the back country, we have been working with the outfitters to ensure their voices are heard in this process.
- We are working hard to support the USFS at all levels with the latest problems they're having with severe personnel and budget cuts. We plan to be there, will help as much as we can. We've written chapter letters to state and federal representatives and senators and are trying hard to get the word out to our members and others that this year is critical for us all to step up to support public lands.
- We have developed a 2025 Trails and Projects Plan that addresses much needed trail work on several trails and where we will hire private crews to do the work. We are planning to do trail work on the Saguache RD for the first time this year. We have purchased fiberglass posts and trail direction decals to remark two trails, including the Chama River Trail on the Conejos Peak RD of the RGNF. We plan to do as many additional FS sign rehabs as we can. We plan to do our annual National Trail Day event at Treasure Falls. We are planning as many chapter day work trips as we can. We have B and C crosscut and chainsaw recertification days set for May.

Issues and Problems

- Still dealing with the general perception of some members that we are a saddle club, but **We Are Gaining Ground**, and more members are seeming to understand the mission of BCHA, with trail riding as a neat other thing we do. A group of four people will offer weekly social rides this year, which will be good.
- Getting younger people on board is still tough.
- Getting people out to do the hard trail tread work is tough.
- Life is Good!
